A grey area

Chris writes: I'm moving into a small house and I have to paint it in a single colour; do you think I should use Plascon's Designer Pearl White (code DRP3) for its shimmering reflection or opt for a light grey?

I'd opt for a matt grey; I prefer the warmer greys to the cooler bluegreys, but it's important to take into consideration your flooring as well as the type of interior you're decorating. A contemporary home can work with

the blue-grey palette but if you prefer a classical French look, the warmer grey palette suits this aesthetic better.

For a cool grey, I'd suggest Plascon's Off Shore and for warm greys, go for Plaster E16-2 or Light Stone Nue06.

The DRP3 Pearl is a spectacular translucent paint applied over a water-based colour. As the light in your room shifts and changes over the course of the day, this product shimmers and reflects different colours. I'd recommend that you apply the Pearl over a base coat of grey on the feature wall in your bedroom to create a little romance.

In the guest bathroom, you could apply Pearl over the grey on the walls using a paint technique called 'dragging off' for a textured effect. This produces a striped or washboard pattern on an already-painted wall by spreading a finish and dragging a long-bristle paintbrush over it while it's still wet. A decorative artist can be commissioned to apply the Pearl as this magical product needs an experienced hand to do it justice.
